1. Title

Tells you what the text is about.

Example: All About Volcanoes

2. Table of Contents

Lists chapters or sections and their page numbers. Helps you find topics quickly.

3. Headings & Subheadings

Organize the text into parts. Headings show big ideas. Subheadings break them down.

4. Photographs & Captions

Photos give a visual of the topic. Captions explain what's in the picture.

5. Bold or Italic Words

Important words that are often defined in the glossary.

6. Diagrams

Drawings that explain how something works.

Example: Diagram of the water cycle

7. Charts & Graphs

Show information in a visual way. Help compare or summarize data.

8. Maps

Show where something happens.

Example: Map of the continents

9. Glossary

A mini dictionary at the back of the book with definitions of key terms.

10. Index

Lists topics in alphabetical order with page numbers. Helps you find information fast.
